




LCMS Synod President Elected

The Rev. Dr. Matthew C. Harrison, having received 51.76 percent of the votes cast, is the president-elect of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) for a fourth term of office, 2019–2022.

The nomination process for the position of Synod president began last fall with the mailing of nominating ballots to all congregations of the Synod. All nominations were required to be submitted by Feb. 20, or five months prior to the start of the Synod convention, when the ballots, received by an outside auditor, were tallied and delivered to the secretary of the Synod.

The resulting candidates for the office of president were the three ordained ministers who received the highest number of votes in the nominations process and who consented to serve if elected. The three nominees for Synod president were Rev. Dr. Harrison; the Rev. Dr. David P.E. Maier, president of the LCMS Michigan District; and the Rev. Timothy M. Klinkenberg, senior pastor of St. John's Lutheran Church, Orange, Calif.



Four weeks prior to the convention, the secretary's office provided a secure method and opportunity for two voting delegates registered by each congregation or parish to participate in the vote via electronic balloting services provided by Election-America, a Garden City, N.Y., company (now to be known as YesElections) that conducted the balloting via a Web-based voting site, June 22–25. The voters in the presidential election were the 6,449 pastoral and lay voters validly registered by the congregations and parishes of the Synod (Bylaw 3.12.2.3) before the March 24 deadline, or their substitutes (as validly submitted before June 15).

The results of the ballot tallied and reported to the secretary of the Synod by Election-America are as follows:

Harrison was voted president-elect: received 3,014 votes (51.76 percent);
Maier received 2,323 votes (39.89 percent); and
Klinkenberg received 486 votes (8.35 percent).

The bylaws of the LCMS instruct the secretary of the Synod to notify the candidates in the Synod's presidential election of the results of the balloting at least two weeks prior to the convention. The candidates were informed on June 26th of the results of the June 22–25 ballot.

Managing Rejection

Sorry for Yourself?


“Have a Happy Face!” (Humph! Easy to say when things are going well. Not so easy when your world turns topsy turvy and you’re rejected.) “Cheer up! Throw yourself a party.” (Yeah! How about a pity-party.)

Elijah Rejected

The O.T. prophet Elijah knew what it was like to be rejected. Overwhelmed with the hostility of wicked King Ahab and Queen Jezebel, he slipped into the pit of self-pity. For boldly speaking against idol worship, Queen Jezebel threatened to kill him. He became a man on the run. At one time he was so discouraged he fell asleep praying God would take His life. God later confronted him hiding in a cave. Full of the pain of rejection, Elijah griped and complained. God lovingly uplifted Elijah from the swamp of self-pity and restored him to a powerful prophetic ministry. Read about it in *1 Kings 19*.

Jesus Rejected

Jesus, the Son of God descended from heaven, should have been overwhelmingly respected. Instead, He was



frequently insulted and rejected. Emotionally stressed, sweating blood while praying in the Garden of Gethsemane, “An angel from heaven appeared to Him and strengthened Him.” (Luke 22:43) Uplifted, He calmly and willingly carried His cross

to Calvary to be crucified for us.

Rejection Caused by Others

The devil uses people to trip us up and cause rejection, especially when we’re doing something good. Elijah’s rejection was caused by others. He was faithfully following God’s will when Ahab and Jezebel murderously rejected him. Our sinless Savior was unjustly rejected through no fault of His own. St. Paul was unfairly rejected. 2 Cor. 11:23-33 describes his unjust imprisonments, floggings, beatings, stonings, betrayals, etc. His sufferings, however, did not plunge him into the mire of self misery. Instead, he writes to the Colossians: “I rejoice in what I suffered for you.”

(Col. 1:24) He writes to the Church at Philippi (and to us): “Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice!” (Phil. 4:4) The word, “always”, reminds us to rejoice during bad times as well as good. Good advice when we suffer rejection for following God’s will and doing good. After fulfilling His Father’s will, Jesus ascended into heaven. Christians, at times rejected on earth, will be accepted in heaven.



Self Caused Rejection

More often than not, offending someone causes a retaliatory response. Hurt someone and you may end up with a bloody nose. King Saul blew it. Because of hostility, pride and sinful decisions, he was rejected by God. (1 Sam. 15:24-26) Then again, the pain of rejection could be internally imagined. Worrywarts sometimes falsely create negative images of themselves and their life circumstances. Losing self-confidence makes them tense and affects their performance. We sometimes see this in athletes.

Tips for Handling Rejection

- **Self Examination** - Are you the cause of your rejection or something/someone else?
- **Take a Nap** - When feeling rejected, rest up. A rested, clearer mind can better see causes.
- **Consult a Close Friend** - Discuss your feelings. A frank discussion may reveal things overlooked.
- **Realize Spiritual Warfare** - The devil is our enemy. His name, Satan, means Accuser. He accuses us before God and us personally to induce feelings of rejection. (Job 1-2) (Zechariah 3)
- **Engage the Spiritual War** - Seek battle strategies in God’s Word. Become a prayerful warrior.
- **Feel Rejected by God for Your Sins?** Repent and believe the Gospel’s full forgiveness. (John 3:16)
- **Feel Rejected by God Because of Troubles?** Trust Him. He lovingly disciplines. (Heb.12:4-11)
- **Be Grateful** - Remembering your good, God-given qualities & blessings should give you a happy face.

NOTES WORTH "NOTING"

Clergy Housing

The Freedom from Religion Foundation, or FFRF, has decided not to pursue an additional challenge of the clergy housing allowance at the Supreme Court level. This means that clergy housing and parsonage allowance provisions will likely to remain in place for tax year 2019 and for years beyond.

For those unfamiliar with court events, the legal battle over the clergy housing allowance has persisted for nearly a decade. FFRF claims that the clergy housing allowance favors clergy as a special class of taxpayer and penalizes ordinary taxpayers and 501(c)(3) organizations who lack such a provision.

FFRF initially won victories at the district court level in 2013 and 2017, but lost at Appeals Court. The next step for FFRF would be to appeal to the US Supreme Court, but they state on their website "After "counting heads," we concluded that any decision from the current court would put the kibosh on challenging the housing allowance for several generations."

2019 LWML National Convention, Mobile, Alabama Report of Western Zone Delegate, Julie Stoller

The 38th Biennial LWML National Convention was held June 20-23rd in Mobile, AL, hosted by the members from the Florida-Georgia, Gulf States, and Louisiana-Mississippi Districts. The convention theme was "In Praise to the Lord!", based on 1 Chronicles 16: 23-24. The Convention Goal Statement was: "Led by God's power, we praise and proclaim the Lord among all the nations.

The first day's events included "Servant Connection" projects, "Gifts from the Heart" collection, delegate orientation, and district caucuses during the day. The opening worship service and celebration of the Lord's Supper that evening was jubilant, with 3,000+ voices joining to sing "Rejoice, O Pilgrim Throng" as the processional anthem. The Rev. Dr. Ulmer Marshall, Jr., of Trinity Lutheran Church, Mobile, AL was the Proclaimer, reminding us that "Praise is what we do as we Remember God's wonderful works, Tell others what great things the Lord has done, and Praise Him and look forward to what He will do for us. The mass choir sang two pieces, "While Shepherds Watched Their Flocks", and "Of the Father's Love". Our spirits were nourished in Holy Communion which was served using beautiful ceramic communion ware created by a local Gulf Shores artist. The opening offering, which amounted to \$43,693.31, was designated to contribute to the 2019-2021 LWML Mission Goal.

Friday, the second day, began with singing, led by the Rev. Dr. Dien Ashley Taylor, our pianist and song leader. The banner procession included the official LWML banner carried by President Patti Ross. District banners were carried in by the District Presidents, accompanied by Young Women Representatives. The banners were unique and beautiful displays reflecting the convention theme, "In Praise to the Lord!".

The first Bible Study, led by Donna Pyle, was titled, "Tell the Story of His Glory." Part 1 was based on the story of King David's first attempt to return the Ark of the Covenant to Jerusalem as told in 1 Chronicles chapter 13. David was an involved and passionate leader, yet his first attempt to bring back the Ark of the Covenant ended in the death of Uzzah, one of the Levites, because the Ark was being transported improperly. We are reminded the God is holy and His Word is to be obeyed.

We were asked to think about how we treat His Word. Do we share it with everyone? Do we approach Him and His Word in reverent fear and respect?

Delegates voted on Bylaws Amendments and the Mission Goal for the biennium. The Rev. Dr. Brent Smith, gave the Keynote Address, encouraging us to sing, tell, declare and go, in joy, to the mission field here and abroad, pressing on in the mission of God, sharing the love of Jesus Christ. The Mites in Action Speakers for the day included Jaclyn Rychel, of Ministry in Mission, Haiti, and Lynn Corker, of Women of the Pearl, Uganda, and Jean Jaskierny, of Tanzanian Sewing Center. Friday evening's entertainment was provided by Joe Castillo, Sand Artist.

Saturday morning the Mission in Motion Pledge Walk was begun with the blowing of the shofar by Steve Cohen and was led by the Excelsior Band of Mobile. 848 walkers proceeded around the Mobile waterfront and raised \$59,612.79 for mission grants.

Saturday morning's meeting began with the Bible Study Part 2 - "Tell the Story of His Glory." Donna Pyle reminded us that our relationship with God is personal. She enumerated ways to commemorate God walking with you by: journaling what God has done, setting apart time to meditate on His Word, talking about His mercy often, using everything around you to remind you of the mercy of God, and praising God. The Mites in Action Speakers this day were Laura Davis Hemminger, of Lutherans for Life, and the Rev. Gregory Manning, of NOLA 4H.

Saturday afternoon session the Election of Officers was held with the following results: Debbie Larson – President, Marie Chow – Vice President of Organizational Resources, Dcns. Betty Knapp – Vice President of Special Focus Ministries, Karla Koehler – Treasurer, and Rev. Brian B. Noack – Pastoral Counselor. The highlight of the day was the revealing of the Mission Grants for 2019-2021. The Grant Goal was enough to fund the top 21 grants. We stood and joined hands and sang "Praise God From Whom All Blessings Flow." The bar has been raised--our new goals are in place. May we respond to God's blessings by promoting and supporting these missions "In Praise to the Lord!"

A Rare and Unforgettable Moment

(A minuscule example of God's creative genius as reflected in the First Article of the Creed)

As if the aforementioned unexpected simultaneous sightings in an otherwise nondescript dead tree were not enough to assimilate in just a few minutes that glorious late spring morning, also observed alighting in a bush between me and this remarkable tree was a perky Blue-Gray Gnatcatcher holding tightly in its beak a dragonfly-like insect nearly half as long as itself.

Seemingly oblivious to my presence, the tiny Gnatcatcher was obviously preoccupied with figuring out how to ingest its “super-sized breakfast” without choking – a seemingly formidable task the feathered sprite finally managed to accomplish before elegantly scraping the side of its beak on a napkin-like twiglet and darting off into the underbrush just to the right of the trail. “Some appetite for a Gnatcatcher,” I thought to myself.

Clearly that morning was a privileged “rarest of moments” literally overflowing with opportunities for experiencing first-hand in highly concentrated form fairly common yet perhaps otherwise “once-in-an-earthly-lifetime” samplings of the magnificent handiwork of our powerful and loving Creator-Redeemer God.

For example, the female Cardinal's compliance in satisfying the voracious appetite of a young Cowbird called to mind my wonderment of a summer scene decades earlier in Connecticut where I chanced to observe a pair of adult Cowbirds with a fully grown streaked-breast juvenile conveniently perched on the same tree branch between them.

What primeval instinct motivated that still only week's-old Cowbird to choose to bond with this parasitic duo (likely the fledgling's biological parents) who would now “mentor” this youngster regarding how to propagate its race by victimizing one of dozens of other potential

foster parent species living in a variety of nesting habitats? The fascinating display that materialized in a matter of minutes that June morning was repeated in only a slightly lesser degree the very next day as while walking with my Lois and our granddaughter, Haley, along that same trail but in the opposite direction shortly before dusk resulted in another amazing influx of birds perched in the very same tree: several Robins and Catbirds, a Flicker Woodpecker, Cedar Waxwings, Yellow Warbler and Song Sparrow.

That other hikers (some with dogs on leash) passed within a few feet of this plethora of roosting winged creatures without disturbing (or likely noticing!) added birds entering or leaving the exposed branches of what I, too, would have perhaps earlier dismissed as little more than an unsightly seemingly useless arboreal candidate for a fireplace.

I now know that the Creator and Preserver of all life also had in mind a different purpose for that still nameless tree as an unusually welcoming gathering-place as well as veritable feast for the eyes of a privileged few observers of what I prefer to call (also among some Audubon Society friends) “God's birds” – reason indeed not only to echo ecological or environmental concerns reminiscent of words like, “Woodman, spare that tree!” but also from a theological perspective in keeping with the psalmist and hymn-writer alike, “MY GOD, HOW GREAT THOU ART!” (see Psalm 104:2)



MOST WOMEN WHO OBTAIN ABORTIONS say they rarely attend church, if at all. According to the research, Protestants are actually under-represented in the population of women having abortions. But it's troubling to learn that "one in five abortion patients [of those who report a religious affiliation] identified themselves as born-again, evangelical, charismatic or fundamentalist."²

The bottom line is, too many teens from Christian homes wind up at abortion clinics. They know having sex before marriage is wrong, but they don't want to disappoint their parents by admitting their sin or the pregnancy that results from it.

Their reaction is almost as old as time. After Adam and Eve sinned, their natural inclination was to hide and cover up. From Eden on, sin has driven us away from God and each other. Yet the good news is that the cross of Jesus Christ brings sinners back together and to God!

REDEEMED PEOPLE SHOULD KNOW BETTER, but sometimes our messages express an utter lack of grace: "Don't bother coming home if you get pregnant!" "I'll disown you if you ever humiliate me that way!" or "You'll be expelled from your Christian school!"... as though unwed pregnancy is the unpardonable sin.

Sometimes teens mistakenly *perceive* this is how parents and others will respond without anyone having said such a thing to them. It's appalling to think that babies have died as a result of a false assumption. Parents would be horrified and heartbroken to learn a grandchild has died on that basis. We need to be pro-active.

LET'S GET A FEW THINGS STRAIGHT:

- A) Sex is God's good gift, intended for the protective provision of marriage.
- B) Sexual sin is wrong whether it results in pregnancy or not.
- C) A baby is God's gift no matter how conceived.
- D) Human beings bear God's image at every stage of life.
- E) Children (born and unborn) should not be killed for a parent's sin.

Teens may be confused on these points and see ending a pregnancy as a way to avoid admitting sexual sin. Some parents of wayward teens may also see abortion as a way to preserve their reputations. The message that's too often heeded is this: "Get rid of the unborn baby and get rid of the problem."

Abortion does *not*, however, solve problems. It does not bring the freedom, joy, grace, acceptance, love, peace, blessing, and hope that confession of sin provides. No, instead it compounds the sin and sorrow.

HOW CAN WE SPARE EACH OTHER PAIN?

What messages can parents, churches, and Christian schools give teenagers to help them understand *both* the sinfulness of sex outside marriage *and* the futility of hiding a resulting pregnancy under the cloak of abortion? Can we encourage confession and pave the way for transformation long before our

children face these temptations? Here are six things we can do:

1 Leave doors of communication open: "You can talk to me about anything."

2 Express a willingness to help in times of trouble: "Whatever happens, we'll get through it together."

3 Be honest and mature about your emotions: "I may feel hurt and get angry when you disappoint me, but I'll never stop loving you."

4 Show mercy to people who confess sin (sexual or otherwise), following Paul's example in 2 Corinthians 2:5-8: "You are forgiven."

5 Demonstrate compassion to families who struggle with a teen's unplanned pregnancy: "How can I help?"

6 Celebrate every baby's life, regardless of how he or she was conceived: "Thank you for not choosing abortion!"

WHERE WILL A TEENAGER GO?

When she becomes pregnant outside marriage, will she go to her parents or to her friends? To the pregnancy care center or to Planned Parenthood? To her church or to the abortion clinic?

No one wants to become an unwitting accomplice in an abortion. Therefore, let's not abandon anyone to abortion through a thoughtless comment. Let's choose our messages wisely.
