LCMS Information Support Network

Rosters & Statistics Implementing Additional Tools & Features

Rosters and Statistics (RS) is continuing to implement additional tools and features in association with the new LCMS Information Support Network (LISN). The Congregation Online Entry System is scheduled for release to all LCMS Member Congregations and New Church Starts later this month. Initially, only the statistics module will be available for congregations to submit their 2018 year-end statistics (see timeline below). Enhancements to the new statistics entry tool include the following:

- · Submitted data is instantly available via District Access to LISN
- · Congregations may access and download submitted records year-round
- · Field-level edits assist the user with proper data entry
- Instant feedback to users regarding statistics that may need reviewed due to extreme changes from prior reports, with options to correct and/or verify
- · Every field includes a definition of the data being requested
- · Video tutorials that demonstrate how to use the features of the system and submit data

As additional modules are added during 2019, congregations will also be able to update demographic and contact information, lay leaders, worship times, ministries, satellite worship sites, and youth.

Statistics Timeline

Jan. 28-Feb. 1

RS will mail login information to congregations.

Feb. 1-Mar. 29

Congregations submit statistics.

RS provides bi-monthly files to LCMS Districts (reports received so far; congregations yet to report).

Apr. 1-30

Close data entry (with COP approval)

Finalize and report the 2018 statistics

Valentine Love Reflections

Valentine's Day

According to legend, Valentine's Day is historically associated with *Valentinus*, a 3rd century Christian martyr. One legend contends he was executed in Rome by Emperor Claudius II. When Claudius decided that single men without family responsibilities made better soldiers, he outlawed military marriages.



Valentinus, a Christian clergyman, defied the edict and conducted secret marriages for soldiers. Other legends suggest Valentinus also helped Christians escape from the cruel, harsh Roman prisons.

According to one legend, when Valentinus was imprisoned awaiting death, he fell in love with the jailer's daughter and, prior to his signed "Erom Your Valentine"

death, sent her a letter signed, "From Your Valentine".

Some claim that the Christian Church may have chosen the middle of February for the feast day of St. Valentinus in an effort to *Christianize* the pagan celebration of *Lupercalla*, a fertility festival dedicated to Faunus, the god of agriculture. It was not until the Middle Ages that Valentine's Day was associated with romantic love when it was commonly believed in France that February 14th was the beginning of the mating season of birds.

The oldest known Valentine message in existence today was a poem written in 1415 by Charles, Duke of Orleans, to his wife when he was imprisoned in the Tower of London.

Love Reflections

A couple in love! What a mystifying, delectable, heavenly experience! *I love you*. The words melt two hearts into one. It's easy to spot a couple in love. You can see it in their eyes and smiles as they walk along together holding hands and cheerfully chatting. There is an eagerness to do and say things to make each other happy. Love is a beautiful, grand bond of giving and sharing. Both are willing to pay the restaurant bill, fill the gas tank, exchange endearing gifts, etc. It's called *romantic* love and should hopefully find its culmination in a three way marriage commitment involving God, bride and groom.

Keeping Love Alive

The saying, "Love is blind but marriage is an eye opener", rings true. Pre-marital counselors alert couples planning marriage to expect pre-marital romantic love to be replaced with a more enduring, stable, down-to-earth, solid, realistic love. Such a solid, mature bond of togetherness will continue to do for each other whatever needs to be done till death them do part. However, the treacherous enemy, selfishness, is ever lurking in the shadows ready to shatter the love bond. A "me-me-me" attitude destroys relationships. The guiding light of God's word will suffocate selfishness to keep the love light glowing. No one is perfect. No marriage is perfect. The Christian virtue of forgiveness is essential to break down the separating walls of sin and selfishness. Col.3:13 is a preservation, restoration dynamic: "Bear with each other and forgive whatever grievances you may have against each other. Forgive as the Lord forgave you." The N.T. word for God's love is *agapay*. Defined, it forgives and forgets unconditionally and does good to those who don't deserve it. John 3:16 epitomizes it with a love proclamation of Christ's redemption.

Love or Lust?

Proper sexual activity is highly recommended and condoned in Scripture. Sexual impulses are Godcreated and have every right to be fulfilled His way. Same-sex marriage is offensive to God. On the basis of established anthropological, historical and societal considerations, it is illogical and unrealistic. Lust, in its many perverted, abusive, sometimes violent forms, is self-serving gratification - the opposite of love which is self-giving. Pornography, a schoolroom for lust, stimulates illicit sexual behavior. The current rash of sexual harassment, rape and child abuse reflects a pornographic type psyche. The N.T. Greek word for lust is epithumesai indicating a desire to covet what is forbidden. Lust, condemned as sin by God, provides momentary illicit self-satisfaction. It lacks the enduring quality of love which seeks the pleasurable satisfaction of one's spouse.

A Few Thoughts about Epiphany Resolutions

We Christians are not the only ones who may have given some thought to "New Year's resolutions" as the secular world, too, talks about "making a fresh start" if only with reference to following a more sensible diet or engaging in a regular program of physical exercise etc.

Especially regarding our lives as Christians, the old evil foe has a distressing number of ways of twisting or perverting some of our seemingly best thoughts about "new beginnings" (the very idea of "new beginnings" could conceivably leave us focusing unduly on our past failures).

Regarding "new beginnings" during this year's prolonged season of Epiphany, should we find ourselves only thinking about "pulling ourselves up by our own bootstraps," thoughts of trusting in Christ in our daily lives easily become left out in the cold with the result that we fail to rely solely on the ongoing blessings of our Christian Baptism into His sinless Brother-Savior's death and resurrection. These thoughts, then, about resolutions which, in themselves, are neither good nor bad.

- First and foremost. prayerfully try to reflect what GOD resolved to do and DID successfully accomplish in sending to our sin-sick, troubled world His sinless incarnate Son to be our Brother-Savior from sin and everlasting death.
- Remember your Baptism on a daily basis also by making a concerted effort not to forget those nearest and dearest to us (see Galatians 6:10; as Christians of all people are easily tempted to ignore or perhaps even hurt most those in our own circle of friends or immediate family (including our congregational church family) those whom we love and who dearly love us).
- Conveniently forgetting perhaps that how we Christians are also to think or act at other times of the year and not just during the Christmas/Epiphany season by dismissing the whole idea of resolutions because of our inability to keep them perfectly is akin to our easily thinking or saying, "I don't believe in telling other people about Jesus because the vast majority won't believe our message anyway!"
- Because it is only the Word of God that effectively does the work of God, set aside prescribed blocks of time in your daily schedule, even if only briefly, to be increasingly "in the Word." Prayerfully read (or listen to audio tapes) "fairly large chunks" of the sacred Scriptures.

Should you fail on occasion perfectly to keep your resolutions (as this side of heaven we all have done), Jesus is ever there to pick us up and keep us on His track and road that alone leads to eternal life (John 14:6) making it a point to remember also to do good to those who are of "the household of faith."
